

Journal

- Define what a "hero" is in your own words. You should base it on your beliefs/opinions. Be sure to be clear of what qualities, skills, accomplishments or other requirements someone must have or do in order to be considered a hero. Read to understand, not just to finish

- It's important to monitor your reading and your comprehension of your reading during the process.
- Annotations (SICQ ones) help with this, but it's not the only thing that does.
- Need to
 - Be in the right frame of mind
 - Be in a situation where you can concentrate
 - Employ strategies when comprehension falters
- Turn to the orange paper we taped in to the back of your English Notebook

Strategies for a Reading Frame of Mind

- Warning signs
- Check your environment
- Strategies to help with understanding.
- You're going to need to use these if you want to understand *The Odyssey*.
- In other words, you must take ownership of your reading and learning if you want to be successful in understanding *The Odyssey*.
 - If you choose to do so, you will be rewarded with a great story and learning experience.
 - If you don't then you won't.

Bookmarks



- To help you track big ideas/subjects that come up throughout *The Odyssey*. These could help you figure out themes.
 - What's the difference between a subject and a theme?
 - Subject=big idea or issue. Short. The basis for a theme.
 - A subject of The Boy in the Black Suit is grief.
 - Theme=message about life, the world, or the human experience. Takes a sentence to say.
 - A theme of *The Boy in the Black Suit* is that in order to deal with grief properly, one should not try to deal with it alone.

- When bookmark subjects (or others you notice) come up, you should annotate them and figure out what Homer is saying about the subject.
- Be careful about only looking at *The Odyssey* from a modern perspective. Also try to figure out what the story is teaching readers about ancient Greek culture and beliefs.



The Odyssey basic background

- Homer is credited with two epic poems:
 - The Iliad: Covers part of Trojan War's final year with a focus on Achilles
 - The Odyssey: Covers Odysseus' ten-year journey home from Troy
- Epic poem = long narrative poem about a hero
- Told orally long before it was written down
- Written between 900-700 BCE.





- Has 24 "books"—which is what we'd call chapters today.
- Starts "in medias res": in the middle of the action. Uses flashbacks.
 - Timeline on bookmark helps.
- 10 years at the Trojan War, 10 years to get home.

Term of the Day: xenia

- Ancient Greek term for "guestfriendship".
 - Greek concept of hospitality
 - mutual respect from host to guest and guest to host
 - generosity and courtesy shown to visitors
 - giving gifts as well as offering food, shelter,
 clothing, entertainment, and favors

Class-wide reading of *The Odyssey* today.

- Read pages 11-14 together (or as far as we get in class)
- Try to annotate for SICQ and for the subjects on the bookmark
- If confusion arises, let's try some strategies to help out.
