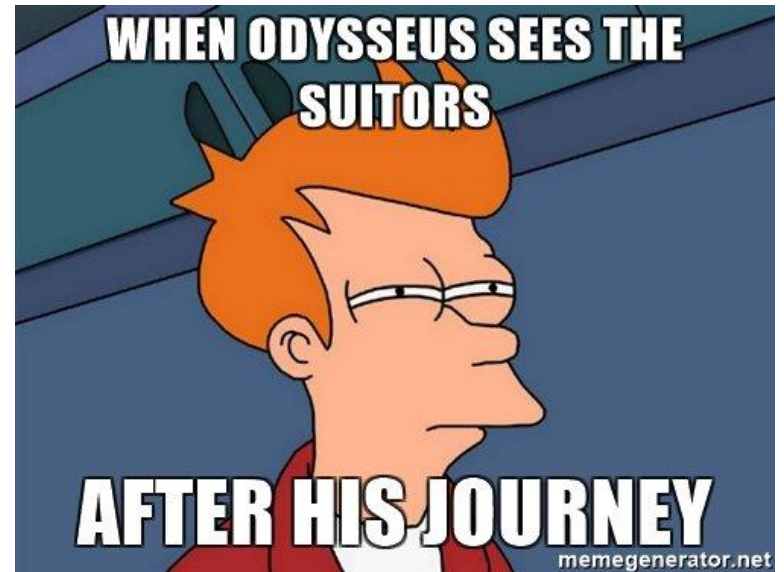

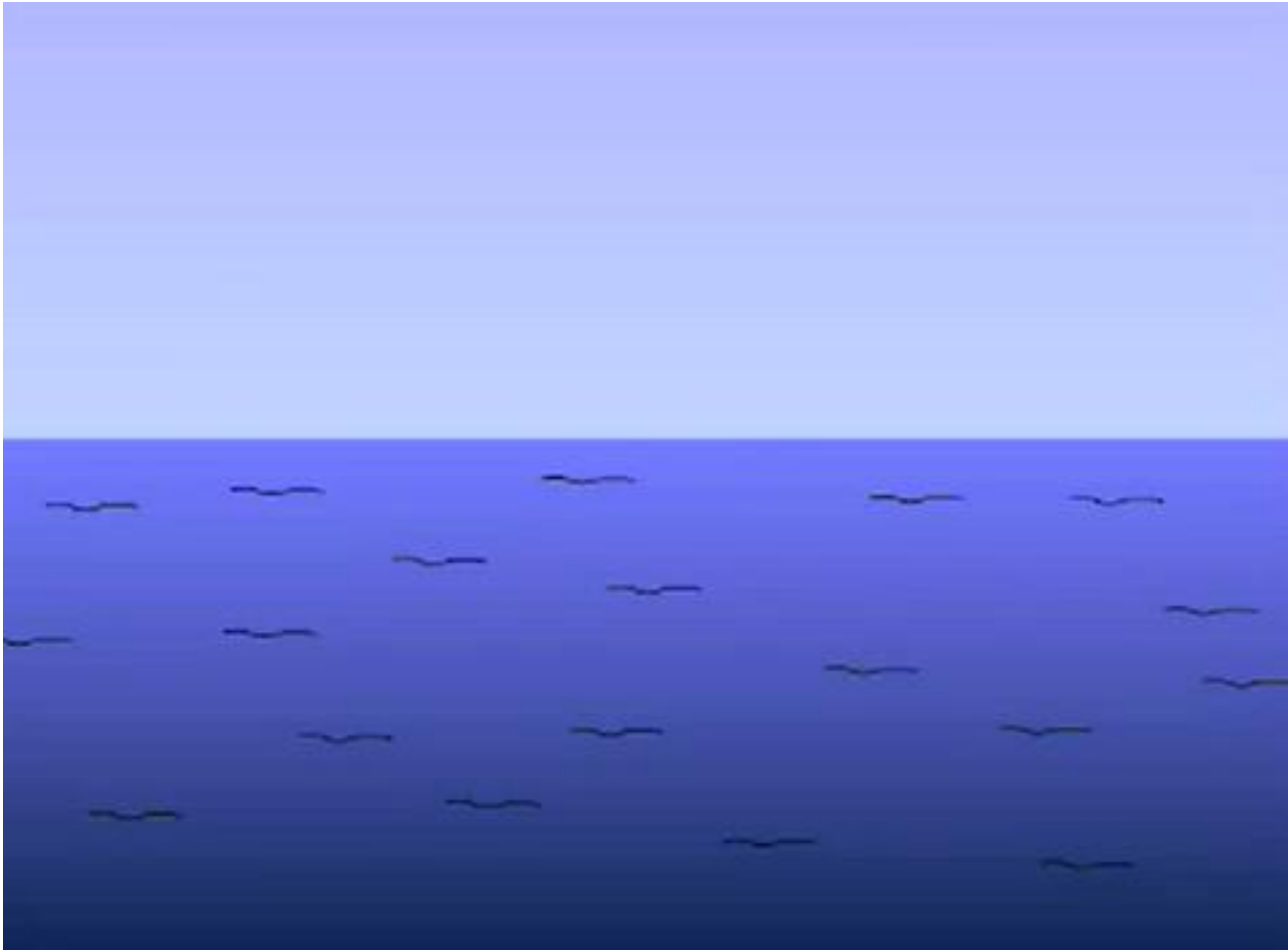
This one's got a typo, but the concept was good enough that I had to include it.

Term of the day: Allusion

- A passing **or** casual reference to a literary or historical person, place, or thing.
- This is a quick shout-out.
- The author makes this reference and expects the audience to recognize it, understand its connection and significance.

Examples:

- Calling someone your “Romeo” or your “Juliet” ...TONS of songs use this!
- Sirius Black in *Harry Potter* (reference to Sirius the “dog star”)
- “My teacher gave us homework over winter break—what a Scrooge!”
